Halloween is All Saints Day Eve

When Christianity came to Europe, Christians made 1 November All Saints Day and said it was a day to remember saints. Christians believed that the spirits of the dead would visit Earth on 31 October, the night before All Saints Day, just as the Celts believed.

Does wearing costumes on Halloween have something to do with this religious belief? Yes, it does. People were afraid of **evil spirits** and thought they might come and do some harm to them. They wore ghost outfits or dressed up like an evil creature to **confuse** the dead.

Halloween is big in the US (美國). The **tradition** of Halloween was taken to the country by **immigrating** Europeans (歐洲人). Americans

modified the traditions a little bit, though. For example, in the US, Jack-o'-lanterns are made from pumpkins, but in Europe, some people carried lanterns made from turnips.

Now, Halloween is not really considered a religious holiday. It is a fun day for children. In the US, children love to dress up as their favourite characters. Each household decorates their home in orange and black. And no one seems to care about evil spirits anymore. Kids go from house to house, knock on doors and say 'trick or treat' to get sweets.

In recent years, people also dressed up as superhero characters, such as Batman and Spiderman. Some even dressed up as an Angry Bird! Eleven percent of people in the US dress up their pets in Halloween costumes.
