STONEHENGE is a famous site in the UK, attracting over a million visitors each year. According to experts, Stonehenge was created over 4,300 years ago. ANGKOR in Cambodia (柬埔寨) was the capital of the old Khmer Empire. Inside Angkor are ruins built from stones, like Angkor Wat and Angkor Thom. Within Angkor Thom is the temple Bayon, which has 54 towers. Every tower has four sides, each with a relief of a smiling face of Jayavarman VII, a bodhisattva. That smile is called 'The Khmer Smile'.


