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The 'aww' factor

Australia

CHINA started sending giant pandas to foreign countries in the 1950s. Back then, the pandas were gifts, but beginning in 1984, the pandas were loaned instead.

In 2015, the two giant pandas at the Toronto Zoo (多倫多動物園) produced a pair of twins. At their naming ceremony, Canadian (加拿大的) Prime Minister Justin Trudeau was given the young pandas to hold. He held one in each arm and seems to enjoy the **occasion** greatly.

Russia

PUTIN is a famous dog lover and world leaders have been trying to give him puppies all the time. For example, in 2010, the Prime Minister of Bulgaria (保加利亞) Boyko Borisov gave him a Bulgarian Shepherd to thank him for signing a deal on a natural gas **pipeline** from Russia to Bulgaria. After the 2011 Tohoku (東北)

earthquake in Japan (日本),
the Akita Prefecture (秋田縣)
gave Putin an Akita Inu for the
large amount of aid Russia
sent. The breed has much
historical **significance** in
Japan, and Hachiko, a dog
famous for his loyalty to his
owner, was of this breed.
