N the past, people communicated over long distances by writing letters, which had to be sent through the post. But sailors or, indeed, anyone by a shore, used to put their letters into a bottle, seal it and then throw it into the sea, where it will float around until someone far away finds it and reads what is inside.

## The captain's reaction


CAPTAIN Botsanenko, now 86 years old, was found by the Russian media network Rossiya 1. He did not recall his note
