



Community centres can do more than host group activities and art exhibitions. A few centres in Yau Ma Tei and Wan Chai serve as community organisers, and help people develop a sense of pride and belonging

District's living room

BASED at the Shanghai Street Artspace, the Yau Ma Tei centre is designed to be different from typical arts centres. "It isn't a place only for displaying art, but a platform for engaging the community," said Roland Ip (葉浩麟), one of the core members of Woofer Ten.

Ten local artists established Woofer Ten in 2009, but they do not see it solely as an arts centre. "Some locals see

it as a community centre; some even mistake it for a council member's office and make complaints to us. Indeed we welcome everyone to come and explore the possibilities it offers here."

Woofer Ten often organises activities to reach out to the neighbourhood. In its first year, the young artists explored stories behind the shops in Shanghai Street and delivered amusing awards to provide support and encouragement to the small shops. For example, a snake shop owner was awarded the 'King of the Snakes' award because of the shop owner's mastery of Qigong (氣功).

This April, they organised a parade in which participants brought wine to nearby shops and had a drink with the shopkeepers.

These activities are not art events, but they bring joy and energy to the community, which is exactly what the centre hopes to do.

There is also a workshop where artists and locals are invited to hold classes, such as painting, Pakistani cooking and Chinese rice cake making. Always crowded with people, the centre is like the neighbourhood's living room.

Apart from workshops and exhibitions, the House organises community tours, led by Wan Chai housewives, of the district's historic buildings. Other events include an annual Mid-Autumn Festival Evening Show, and a paper puppet show created by the locals about the history of the Blue House. In a recent evening music show, independent musicians played while others enjoyed a night of music

"There used to be a lot of public areas for locals to gather," Chau said. "But now they are losing such space and it's no surprise that they are drifting apart." Chau felt that the House drew Wan Chai locals closer. "People might not come only for the activities. They are always welcome to drop by for a chat."

There was a strong **bond** between Wan Chai and its people, Chau explained. "They may seem a bit quiet but they are actually very friendly. As neighbours they care about each other. This kind of neighbourhood ambience could only be found in old districts."
